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Road Safety Action Plan – Vision Zero

On Average In the City of Phoenix...

EVERY DAY,

There are 83 automobile crashes.

EVERY OTHER DAY,

There is at least one <u>fatal</u> car crash.

IN A SINGLE YEAR,

There are 190 people killed, enough to fill a commercial airliner.



If one fully loaded commercial airliner were to crash with no surviving passengers each year, imagine for a moment what the response would be.

Lives lost through motor vehicle crashes deserve the same attention.



VISION: Phoenix aspires to reduce the number of fatal and serious injury crashes on its streets to ZERO by 2050




High Injury Network (HIN)

Designed to identify roads and intersections with the highest number of killed & serious injury (KSI) crashes

Two categories: Signalized Intersections & Segments

Functions as a tool to focus limited resources






Engineering - Infrastructure improvements

- 20 Traffic Signals have been rebuilt
- 12 New Traffic Signals
- **4 Road Safety Assessments** Independent Multi-Disciplinary review of a specific location that has been identified as a safety concern.

Speed Hump/Cushion Programs

Other Traffic Management Programs

 Stop Signs
Radar Trailer Deployment
Police Enforcement

Speed Humps

Run continuously across street

✓ Local streets only

✓ Slows all vehicles







Speed Cushions

- Runs continuously with grooves cut for fire trucks
- ✓ <u>Collector streets only</u>
- Slows all vehicles except fire trucks

Traffic Calming Costs and Requirements

- Traffic study to determine the average speed of traffic on a street.
- The study may qualify a community for subsidy to cover a portion of the cost.
- Speed Humps: \$100 \$1,200 each
- Speed Cushions: \$200 and \$2,800 each
- The final step of the process is a petition process of the adjacent property owners.

Will More Stop Signs Slow Traffic?



The City of Phoenix follows national standards which require certain criteria to exist before a Stop Sign can be installed.

Stop Signs are justified when:

- Traffic volumes are equal
- Visibility obstructions exist
- Crash problems exist

Temporary Radar Speed Trailer





These units are deployed for one week at a time and are intended to remind drivers of the posted speed limit.




Phoenix Police Department Traffic Complaint Hotline

If speeding or other traffic are a concern near your business, you may call 534-SPEED or 602-534-7733. Traffic of concern near your business or in your parking lot may be reported. Or, you may use this online form to report issues. The City of Phoenix Police Department will assign an officer to handle the traffic issue. During normal business hours the telephone hotline is manned by an officer to receive your comments, complaints or questions.

After normal business hours you will reach a message recorder to voice your concern/s. A Phoenix Police Officer will call you back. The telephone hotline is not an emergency phone number. If you have a current emergency, please call 9-1-1. https://www.phoenix.gov/police/policereport
